## Affection Lure

### Lesson #7

The intention here is to focus on the positive aspects of love: the love of God, parents, family and friends. Keeping in mind the way this lure is used to harm children, this lesson serves to remind us that the Christian life is founded on knowledge of God’s love. The Christian life is lived out through love of one another which models this love of God. (JPPI 1981) *Familiaris Consortio* describes the role which the family plays in the world today. It is our hope that the children in our care experience the love of God through their family.

John’s letter reminds us that we have come to know and believe in this love which God has for us. God calls us into existence through love; at the same time, God calls us for love. Believing that love is the fundamental, innate vocation of every human being, the focus of this lesson is this call for love.

1Corinthians provides a clear description of what love is: patient, kind, believes, bears, hopes and endures all things. Paul’s letter also tells us what love is not: jealous, pompous, rude, quick-tempered, brooding nor does it rejoice over wrongdoing.

St. Valentine is western culture’s quintessential symbol of love. Older children could be invited to find out how this came about.

The celebration of the Eucharist, memorial of Jesus’ sacrifice and death for our sins, is the definitive example of God’s love. Through our participation, joining with each other, we show our desire to share this love with each other and the whole of God’s creation.

With older children it is possible to discuss Jesus’ exhortation in Mark to “love your enemies” or from John “As I have loved you, so you also should love one another”. Just what would that mean in their lives; what would it mean for our world?
